Radio-Television-Film Lecturer Olga White presented at the International Conference on Communication and Media Studies: "Media and Development." Her ongoing research uses semiotic analysis to explore U.S. hegemonic culture in online communication. Specifically, the current research is focused on the FBI meme trope, and makes the argument that memes should not be studied based on when they were viral, but rather once a meme transcends going viral and becomes a persistent trope within meme culture.

Johnny Moreno





Teresa Veramendi



An excerpt from Theatre Arts Lecturer Teresa Veramendi's 2018 documentary play "Santuario|Sanctuary" will be published in the upcoming Fall/Winter 2022-23 issue of the Chicana/Latina Studies Journal. Veramendi was also awarded the Norma Elia Cantú Award in Creative Writing, which highlights exceptional writing by diverse authors in the journal. The bilingual theatre piece follows the parallel and divergent experiences of youth and monarch butterflies on their migrations across the USA-Mexico border. To create the piece, Veramendi and her collaborators conducted over 35 interviews in Colorado, Illinois, California, Texas, and

Her initial goals were to strengthen her confidence as an actor and motivate herself out of a pandemic slump by reigniting her passion for acting, and Erica accomplished both. Two years in the making, Erica says that her getting to and completing this intensive is the thing she is most proud of to date.

Forster's A Passage to India, PASSAGE is set in the fictional Country X, which is a neocolonial state of Country Y. B, a doctor, and F, an veteran teacher, begin to forge a bond that is tested after a fateful trip to a local attraction. An insight into how power imbalances affect personal and interpersonal dynamics across a gamut of situations.

Into the Woods written by James Lapine with music and lyrics by Stephen Sondheim, directed by Kirsten Brandt, vocal direction by Sandra Bengochea, conducted by Dr. Fred Cohen runs in the Hammer Theatre Center November 11-12 and 16-20. THE STORY: Into the Woods intertwines the plots of several Brothers Grimm fairy tales, exploring the consequences of the characters' wishes and quests. The main characters are taken from "Little Red Riding Hood," "Jack and the Beanstalk," "Rapunzel," and "Cinderella," as well as several others. The musical is tied together by a story involving a childless baker and his wife and their quest to begin a family, their interaction with a witch who has placed a curse on them, and their interaction with other storybook characters during their journey.
