Course Description

In this course we introduce and explore various drawing concepts, media, and technical skills with an emphasis on working from observation. The course will also introduce broader drawing concepts that explore multiple approaches to the act of drawing and consider the state of drawing in contemporary practice.

Course Goals and Student Learning Objectives

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

1. Create works in a wide range of media and materials, including but not limited to: charcoal, pencil and graphite, ink, various drawing tools, and a variety of papers that are instrumental in making drawing successful.
2. See and visually comprehend, specifically in relation to the process of drawing.
3. Understand and apply pictorial principles, including: the picture plane, compositional frameworks, and the overall design of pictorial space.
4. Demonstrate an awareness and sensitivity to the nature and importance of line, weight, form, volume, texture and pattern.
5. Discern the challenging applications of tone and value and demonstrate sensitivity to issues of light and space.

6. Employ drawing as an investigative process, in a variety of applications, and communicate their experiences through the act of drawing and practice.

Classroom Protocol

Objectives for each class will be outlined at the start of each day. It is imperative that you arrive to class on time and with all materials necessary, ready to work.

The structure of the course is one that encourages students to participate and take responsibility for their own learning experience. Think of our time in class as a laboratory, where you are encouraged to explore the concepts and topics set forth.

Cell phone use during class time is restricted to educational and musical uses when appropriate. We will take a 15 minute break at the halfway point of each class, please use this time appropriately so that our work time can be focused on work.

Throughout the course we will conduct critiques and discussions. These may focus on in class work, homework, or other topics. Participation from all students is required. Students are also required to maintain a portfolio of all work throughout the semester. Portfolios will be collected periodically for both evaluation and for discussion with students.

Due to the nature of the course it is imperative that you attend all classes. In class work and participation makes up a large portion of your course grade. In the event that you must miss a class it is always better to notify me ahead of time so that appropriate alternatives can be made. Due to the nature of the course it is extremely detrimental to your educational experience to miss class time.

(Note: According to University policy F69-24, “Students attend all meetings of their classes, not only because they are responsible for material discussed therein, but because active participation is frequently essential to insure maximum benefit for all members of the class. Attendance per se shall not be used as a criterion for grading.”)

Assignments and Grading Policy

Grading will be based upon a combination of in class work, homework, participation, and midterms/finals as assigned.

In class work consists of all work made over the course of the semester. I expect all students to keep everything that they produce and maintain all work in their portfolios.

Homework assignments will be assigned weekly and will vary in scope and concept, but will coincide and aid the in class work. Homework will include drawings, readings, writing assignments, research and any midterms/finals and is to be maintained as a portion of each student’s portfolio. It is your responsibility to know what has been assigned and when homework is due.

Participation includes each student's engagement with their work and the work of their peers both in and out of class. It includes class discussions and critiques as well as the day-to-day class environment.

Portfolios will be collected throughout the semester for assessment and feedback.
