Pg. 112 "'But you're so powerful! If you really wanted to go there, wouldn't you arrange something?' .... 'What's the point of seeing them if I don't own them?' was Childersin's rejoinder."

This quote gives a really good idea as to why the residents of Caverna don't go to the upper world. This passage also shows the dynamic between Maxim Childersin and Neverfell. While Neverfell is more interested in the beauty of things, Childersin just wants power. This also shows Neverfell's naivete. She likes to believe the best in people.

Pg. 82 "The skin of the face she had seen in the mirror had been pale, with a dappling of faint freckles".... "You locked me away for seven years, Master Grandible. For nothing."

This is the first moment when she finds out that she can make facial expressions. Her first reaction after horror and fear, is anger. Anger at having been previously trapped, anger at having been lied to, and anger at the fact that no one will believe her. She is also scared, she has heard about the enquirers, she knows she can be put to death for seeming to do the wrong thing. All she wanted to do was fix her mistake.

Pg. 101 "Zouelle shook her head.... 'Your in the game now, my dear. There is no going back.' "

This is something that shows the political landscape of Caverna. One small slip up can cause your entire family to suffer, or it can turn your family against you in order to survive. Zouelle is new to the landscape and thinks she can handle it, but finds she is very wrong.
