




2010 GLAC BEST GLOBAL LEADERSHIP RESEARCH AWARDS

GLAC Best Dissertation Award for 2010



Dr. Ugur Yeliz Eseryel

"Leadership Behaviors and Perception in Self-Managing Virtual Teams." Dr. Eseryel's dissertation committee was chaired by Dr. Robert Heckman at Syracuse University. Her dissertation is a methodological tour de force, an outstanding example of longitudinal, qualitative research. She identified behaviors that cause virtual team members to be perceived as leaders and reconceptualized leadership as a dynamic team-level phenomenon. This dissertation was selected in part due to the importance of the virtual team experience in global leadership development. Dr. Eseryel is currently an Assistant Professor in the Faculty of Business and ICT at Groningen University, The Netherlands.

GLAC Best Article Award for 2010

"Defining the Content Domain of Intercultural Competence for Global Leaders." *Journal of Managerial Psychology*, 25(8): 810-828. After reviewing the global leadership and expatriation literature, the authors integrated and synthesized prior theoretical and empirical efforts to develop a comprehensive domain definition for intercultural competence in the context of global leadership. The domain consists of three dimensions – perception management, relationship management, and self management – and 17 facets. This type of foundational research brings greater clarity to the fields of intercultural competence and global leadership.
