Course Description

The laboratory course is designed to provide hands-on experience in the prevention and care of athletic injuries including preventative and supportive taping techniques, emergency management, and various hands-on experiences related to the prevention of activity related injuries.

Course Goals and Student Learning Objectives

Upon completion of this course, students should:

1. Demonstrate a mastery of emergency management techniques.
2. Demonstrate an understanding of athletic prophylactics and immobilization equipment.
3. Demonstrate the ability to perform taping skills related to injury prevention techniques.

4. Demonstrate an understanding for preventative and supportive taping and other basic techniques associated with the diverse aspects of athletic training and related professions.

Assignments and Grading Policy

Students will be evaluated by the following methods:

1) Oral Practical Examination

There will be 2 practical examinations during the semester. The practical examinations will be conducted during scheduled class times. Each student will sign up for a specific segment of time with a partner. Examination dates are noted on the attached tentative course schedule. Each practical examination will be worth up to 60 points. **OP exams cannot be made up**, unless for significant circumstances.

2) Laboratory Assignments

There will be a total of 4 laboratory assignments during the semester. Laboratory assignment dates are noted on the attached tentative schedule. Generally, the laboratory assignments will be due at the end of each associated class meeting or at the outset of the next class meeting. The nature of the laboratory assignments will vary throughout the semester based upon the respective material addressed. Additional information regarding each assignment will be discussed in class at the time of distribution. Each laboratory assignments will be worth 10 points.

3) Final Exam

There will be an online final exam. Quizzes will cover prior material covered in lab or notes provided on Canvas. Quizzes will be written at the beginning of lab sessions. Lab quizzes cannot be made up, unless for considerable circumstances.
