Course Description

This course explores systems of language and logic in oral and written discourse, with a focus on the role of shared assumptions, language style and the media of presentation in shaping the form and content of argumentation. We will study well-established techniques of critical thinking and apply them to written documents such as newspaper articles, magazine articles, essays, and websites with a focus on current events. Successful students will become skilled at analyzing arguments and producing arguments of their own.

Grading Policies

The assignments in this class count towards your final grade on a weighted basis. Each assignment has a point value; once the assignment is graded, the points earned are divided by the total points, and then converted to Final Grade Points per weighted value given in the chart above.

You can expect that I will grade your assignments within a week after they are submitted. On occasion grading may be delayed if my grading load is unusually heavy; however, in no case will the delay between submission and grading of the assignment be longer than two weeks.

Grades will not be adjusted (rounded up or down) at the end of the semester nor will any additional extra credit assignments be offered -- your final grade will be the letter equivalent of the percentage that is shown on Canvas after all assignments have been submitted and graded. I **will not** respond to any emails asking for a grade adjustment after the course has ended.

Your final letter grade will be assigned according to the chart below:

NOTE that you must earn at least 70%, or a C-, to receive credit for this course.

Modules

This course is set up as a series of weekly modules. Each module contains a list of all activities due for the week and links to those activities. Except for the Week 1 module (which opens on the first day of the semester) **modules open on Sunday at midnight and close the following Sunday at 11:59pm**. Canvas measures time in seconds, so this deadline is 11:59:00 pm. After a module closes, assignment dropboxes, quizzes, and tests will no longer be available; however, all other material (readings and lecture videos) will remain available until the end of the semester.

Weekly activities are listed in the order that I suggest you complete them; however, you are free to navigate through the activities in whichever order that you wish. Because each week's lessons build upon the prior week's activities, you should complete ALL of the activities in a module before you begin work on the next one.

Late Policy

No late assignments are accepted: once the deadline passes, the dropbox will close and you will NOT be able to submit assignments or access quizzes and exams.

However, I understand that real life can interfere with your studies and that in rare circumstances it may be difficult or impossible for you to submit an assignment. In this case, I ask that you contact me at least 12 hours prior to a deadline to request an extension. Permission to submit late work is discretionary and typically will only be granted for a documented family or personal emergency.

Assignments are considered to be submitted when they are uploaded to Canvas. For this reason, I strongly suggest that you do not wait until the last minute to submit an assignment; depending upon the wifi speed, it may take some time to complete the file upload. If you do miss a deadline, **DO NOT** email me the assignment to prove that it was completed on time; assignments that are emailed to me **WILL NOT be graded**.

Assignments will be graded as uploaded to Canvas. You must upload your assignment as a .doc, .docx, .pdf, or Google file. If you upload an incorrect or blank file you will earn NO POINTS for the assignment. You can avoid this problem by clicking on the "View Submission" option after uploading your work to make sure that you have submitted the correct file.

Description of Course Assignments

Lectures and Discussion Based on Readings – You should complete the assigned readings and view all assigned video lectures, which are designed to increase your understanding of course concepts. These are posted on Canvas and can be accessed through the weekly modules.

Problem Sets – Problem sets should be downloaded from Canvas, completed, and uploaded to Canvas to the appropriate assignment dropbox by the due date/time. **Problem sets must be submitted as a Word document (.doc or .docx), an Adobe (.pdf) file or a Google document.** Any problem set that is submitted in an incorrect format will not be graded.

Weekly Discussion Posts – For the eight weeks of the semester you will be asked to complete a weekly discussion assignment. The last seven of these posts will require you to find and discuss an article on a current and controversial issue; you will choose the topic of your final essay from these articles. Please remember to follow the online etiquette guidelines (see Week 1 Module) in your discussion board activity and to **completely read the discussion assignment prompt** before posting.

Weekly Quizzes - You will take weekly quizzes designed to review important concepts covered in the weekly modules; you should use these as 'self-checks' to gauge your understanding of what you have studied. You will have two opportunities to take these quizzes, and your lowest score of the two will be dropped.

Oral Argument/Analysis – During Week 2 of the semester, you will video record and submit a short oral argument (5-10 minutes) on a current and controversial topic selected by your instructor. In Week 8, you will watch your video and write and submit a written analysis of your argument. **All written assignments must be uploaded to the appropriate dropbox on Canvas by the due date/time and must be submitted as a Word document (.doc or .docx), an Adobe (.pdf) file, or a Google document.**

Argumentative Essay Project – In this essay you will explore the arguments surrounding a current and controversial issue. You will submit a topic worksheet, a critical analysis of the two sides of the controversial issue, a works cited page, and two drafts of your final argument, one which will be peer reviewed. **All written assignments must be uploaded to the appropriate dropbox on Canvas by the due date/time and must be submitted as a Word document (.doc or .docx), an Adobe (.pdf) file or a Google document.**

Midterm Exam – A midterm exam will be given during the eighth week of the semester; it will contain questions like the ones in your textbook and in the problem sets. A study guide for the midterm will be posted on Canvas.

Extra Credit - You will have the option to complete an extra credit problem set covering topics studied throughout the semester. You may earn a maximum of 25 points, or 2.5%, extra credit for this assignment.
