Course Requirements and Assignments

In-Class Activities: 15% of final course grade

There will be graded in-class activities during each class meeting unless noted otherwise on the course schedule. These assignments will be used to determine your familiarity with the assigned readings and media. In-class activities cannot be made up.

The four (4) lowest-scored in-class activities will be dropped from the final course grade. In-class activities are not eligible for makeup.

Reading Responses: 30% of final grade

You will compose a written response for assigned readings that engages a series of analytical and reflective discussion questions about the reading. These responses should demonstrate the following:

- 1. That you completed the assigned reading in its entirety.
- 2. You have taken focused reading notes and can identify, analyze, and discuss key concepts, arguments, and elements of research that the author uses to express and develop their argument.
- 3. You can reflect on the connections between this reading and the other texts, concepts, and topics we explored during the current unit.

These responses will be due before the start of the class in which they will be discussed.

Writing Partners: 20% of final grade

This semester, we will be pairing up with CommUniverCity on campus for a letter-writing program. You'll be a "Writing Partner" to a student at Olinder Elementary who has experience to higher education. The program is an experiment in anticipatory socialization to help encourage these youth to aspire to college. You will communicate regularly with your partner throughout the semester. At a minimum, you will write three (3) directed letters and create a presentation of your favorite places on campus for them. More information is available on Canvas.

At the end of the semester, there will be an opportunity to meet with your writing partner on campus. This event will occur during normal business hours (9 AM-5 PM) outside the regularly scheduled class time. Therefore participation in this event will be counted as extra credit for the course and, if earned, will be credited towards the Writing Partners portion of the final grade.

The meeting with Writing Partners will occur on Friday, December 8 (Time and Location TBD)

Weekly Reflections: 25% of final course grade

Each week you will be preparing a 500 to 800-word reflection responding to the prompts. While these are informal writing exercises you must support your positions with factual evidence by drawing support from the course readings.

Final Reflection: 10% of final grade

At the end of the semester, you submit a final reflection. In this reflection, you will consider the learning outcomes of this course, course material, assignments, and specifically the interactions with your Writing Partner. This reflection will take the form of a 4 to 5-page paper. Details will be made on Canvas.

Grading Information

Grades will be determined solely based on the work quality for the above-mentioned assignments. There is one extra credit opportunity this semester. Neither assignments nor the course will be curved. No grades will be rounded up or down for any reason.

Time Commitment and Student Success

"Success in this course is based on the expectation that students will spend, for each unit of credit, a minimum of 45 hours over the

length of the course (normally three hours per unit per week) for instruction, preparation/studying, or course-related activities, including but not limited to internships, labs, and clinical practica. Other course structures will have equivalent workload expectations described in the syllabus."
