Course Description *University catalog*

This course is designed to introduce students to the basic concepts, theories, and methods of sociology. My intention is to give students a broad overview of sociology so that they may then make an informed choice about further study in this discipline. Together we will critically examine the applicability of sociology to everyday life. We will assess the usefulness of a sociological perspective, and the depth of sociological method.

Course Goals and Specific Learning Objectives

Goals: The purpose of this course is to introduce students to the study of the current social structure and possible social problems facing American society today. During our studies we will introduce and apply some core sociological theories and concepts to better contextualize and understand social arrangement and social problems, to further develop our sociological imaginations, and to discuss and devise social solutions. This will be approached in the context of using value systems, social groups, economic structures, and political institutions. The specific learning objectives are as follows

Students have many options relating to the required textbook. Students can rent or buy new and used textbooks, or use an E-book. As long as students use the proper edition the choice of format is up to students.

Textbooks offered at our campus bookstore are for convenience, but there is no requirement that class textbooks be purchased from the campus bookstore. TEXTBOOK OPTIONS offered at the campus bookstore are NOT REQUIRED, they are simply recommendations. The textbook is also available from other sources, if you so choose. Be sure to purchase the proper edition of your textbook.

Reading should be done per our class syllabus (Usually 1 - 2 chapters per week) Students will be better prepared to discuss the material, and better prepared for asking questions about material that needs more explanation. See reading schedule on Class Calendar page. Students are expected to use the proper edition of the assigned textbook. Older editions may not contain all the information that is listed on your exam study guides, and students that use the wrong textbook will be solely responsible for obtaining the missing information.

Classroom Protocol

<u>Office Hours:</u> In-person office hours are by appointment only during the Covid protocol. Feel free to contact me online or by email if you have any questions about the class or course material.

<u>Technology Requirements:</u> All students should have access to a computer and good internet service for this class. Campus computers may be available for student use. If a student travels, access is required and missing access may result in the student being dropped from the class or failing the class.

<u>Plus / Minus Grading (Final Class Grades):</u> Use the posted grade scale to differentiate grades. Plus / Minus grading is used to differentiate grades that are very close to the grade margins. Because plus/minus grading is used, the instructor does not automatically "round-up" grades. <u>Even one or two points can make a difference between an "A", "A-", or "B+".</u>

<u>Pass / No Pass:</u> Please contact and make arrangements with Admissions & Records directly. I am not involved in determining Plus / Minus grading

In the college classroom, grading is an institutional requirement. There is no perfect grading system, however, it is a necessity for this college and this classroom. The instructor's goal in grading is to assess the student's understanding of core subject matter as measured by a written exam. Grading is **objective**, based on exam scores and the quality of work produced in any graded class assignments. Grading is **not subjective** based upon how hard a student tries, or how much time is spent in studying. Unfortunately for some students, the reality is that grades in this class are based upon results and not necessarily a reflection of effort. **There is limited extra credit in the class, please do not ask for additional extra credit**

There are three (3) major midterm exams given in this class. Each exam is worth 100 points and will consist of 50 questions. All exams are multiple choice. In-class exams will be allowed limited notes, per the instructor and the class syllabus. For this class students are allowed 2 sheets of paper (8 x 11), using all sides of the paper. Other notes, books, or electronic devices shall not be used. NO all-inclusive final exam given.

<u>Retake Midterms:</u> If a student misses the Midterm exam date, they will have to wait until the retake midterm date for a make-up exam. Students may retake one Midterm, on the retake midterm date, to try to improve an exam score. Students that take a retake exam to better ONE exam score, or to make-up a missed exam, will keep the higher grade. Students may not retake or make-up more than one exam. Retake Midterms are offered on the last day of class only.

IN-CLASS DISCUSSION PARTICIPATION: (35 points total)

In-class participation fosters student learning, and helps to strengthen the culture in the classroom. Participation is measured by being present, and available for discussion. If a student is not present in the classroom during the class discussion, it is impossible to re-create the experience through a make-up assignment. Unfortunately, excused and un-excused absences are treated the same for these assignments. There is no make-up work available for missed in-class discussions. Each scheduled in-class discussion is worth (5 points) each.

Each quiz will cover 2-3 chapters. Quizzes are open-book and open-note, and should be done in groups in the classroom. Quizzes are for practice and study purpose only, they are NOT for grade assessment. Students will see examples of the types of questions seen on the exams. There will be 6 quizzes in total, 10 questions, multiple-choice format for each quiz. If a student misses the quiz, they may ask the instructor for a copy, at the next classroom meeting. I recommend not missing the in-class quiz, as it is a good study aid, and a chance to get some classroom help from your classmates.

Extra Credit grading: To access the discussion board: go to Canvas and open your class. In the left-hand navigation bar click on the "Discussions" link, and find the required discussion.

A completed discussion board includes an original response at 175-200 words answering the question prompt(s). Write the word count of your response at the end of your response, to be considered for full credit. Full credit may not be given if no written word count.

<u>DO NOT RESEARCH</u> or give information from other sources. This should be in your own words, using your own ideas, thoughts and opinions. **<u>COPYING FROM A SOURCE</u>**, even when crediting the source will not be accepted for any credit.

<u>These are opinion-based responses</u> relating to a topic question posted on the discussion board. The response must be meaningful. Grading is based upon a meaningful and appropriate answer. <u>REMEMBER</u> that this is an interactive class assignment....your classmates will be able to read what you write, and they will be able to respond back to you.

Feel free to respond back to your classmates' responses. No credit will be given to responding back to a classmate, however, it will help build a class community, and it is nice to know that others have read what you have written.

Power outages, loss of internet or technology, are never acceptable reasons to miss the discussion deadlines. NO LATE work is accepted under any circumstances. Once the discussion board is closed, it will not be re-opened. I realize that we cannot predict when a problem will occur, however, students are given several days in which to complete discussion boards. Please do not wait until the final hours of the deadline date to submit discussions.....as you are taking a chance that no problems will occur. If a problem does occur, missed points will result.

The only extra credit in this class are the extra credit discussion questions in the class discussion board. NO OTHER extra credit assignments are available. PLEASE DO NOT ASK.

FREOUENTLY ASKED OUESTIONS ABOUT THIS CLASS

Do we have any required class orientation, either online or on-campus?

For in-person classes: class curriculum and class assignments will be discussed at the first classroom meeting.

How do we access the online class material?

Go to the college website and access our class homepage on CANVAS. All available class material is located on our class homepage. Announcements are available, as well as downloadable material. The extra credit discussion boards are located on CANVAS.

Can I use a different edition of the textbook?

No. You should use the print copy or e-book for the textbook as described in your class syllabus. A print copy is not necessary, and an e-book will suffice, however, that is the choice for students to make.

What if I cannot afford to get my book right away?

Students need to have access to the textbook as soon as possible once class begins. Students may have to borrow the book or ask another classmate for a book sharing. Students will be at a disadvantage if they do not do the required readings.

Is there a study guide I can use to prepare for exams?

Yes. Please see the "files" folder in CANVAS. The exam study guide will be posted there.

If I miss an exam deadline can I do a make-up exam?

If a student misses the original exam deadline, contact the instructor immediately. Make-up exams will be given on the last day of class only, during RETAKE EXAMS. ONLY one make-up exam per student allowed during the semester. Make-up exams count as a RETAKE EXAM. Missed quizzes can be obtained from the instructor.

If I do poorly on the Major Exams, can I still pass this class?

Probably not. Major exams usually constitute a total of 90% of your overall grade. There is limited extra credit to compensate for the low exam grades. Students are allowed <u>one</u> RETAKE EXAM for the semester. If a student is not performing well on exams, they should consider dropping the class, and taking the class at another time when they are better prepared.

What is a RETAKE EXAM?

Students are allowed to take <u>one</u> RETAKE EXAM during the semester. RETAKE exams are only offered on the last day of class, as scheduled on the syllabus. A RETAKE exam can be a make-up exam of a missed exam, or a second-chance to improve one midterm exam grade. ONLY ONE RETAKE EXAM may be taken per student. Multiple Retakes are not allowed, no exceptions.

Is there any extra credit or other work I can do to improve my grade?

Limited. Students are graded based on the assigned work and the Major Exams. If any extra credit is available it will be described in your class syllabus. Please do not ask for any additional extra credit. See the class grading scale.....since plus/minus grading is used, I do not automatically round-up grades. Plus/minus grading should suffice and should accurately award students the grade they deserve based upon grading criteria.

How do I keep track of my grades, and my progress in this class?

Peer Connections, a campus-wide resource for mentoring and tutoring, strives to inspire students to develop their potential as independent learners while they learn to successfully navigate through their university experience. You are encouraged to take advantage of their services which include course-content based tutoring, enhanced study and time management skills, more effective critical thinking strategies, decision making and problem-solving abilities, and campus resource referrals.

In addition to offering small group, individual, and drop-in tutoring for a number of undergraduate courses, consultation with mentors is available on a drop-in or by appointment basis. Workshops are offered on a wide variety of topics including preparing for the Writing Skills Test (WST), improving your learning and memory, alleviating procrastination, surviving your first semester at SJSU, and other related topics. A computer lab and study space are also available for student use in Room 600 of Student Services Center (SSC).

Peer Connections is located in three locations: SSC, Room 600 (10th Street Garage on the corner of 10th and San Fernando Street), at the 1st floor entrance of Clark Hall, and in the Living Learning Center (LLC) in Campus Village Housing Building B.
