🗿 Course Goals

Course description: This course will examine the institution of higher education and its relationship to and with society. Structural reproduction of education-based inequalities will be discussed. The course will draw on sociological, political, philosophical and economic perspectives of higher education. The intent of the course is to analyze the environment of higher education from both a macro and micro perspective. To this end, material will be based on both qualitative descriptions and quantitative trends of contemporary issues in the field of higher education. Part of this process will involve an analysis of the way in which certain issues become the focus of public policy while other issues are absent from this arena.

In the process of examining the terrain of higher education, the course will address a number of other relevant topics, including educational inequalities, social class, racial segregation, labor markets, social capital, cultural capital, human capital, dual frames of reference, the gender gap, identity development, opportunity structures and consequences of policy.
