#### Course Learning Outcomes (CLOs)

In this class, we will explore Environmental Sociology. This course will analyze how human beings interact with, shape and are shaped by their environment from both macro and micro perspectives. Material will be based on both qualitative descriptions and quantitative trends of contemporary environmental sociological research.

This course will challenge the human exceptionalism paradigm and will answer the following questions: How do personal issues and environmental problems overlap? Which environmental concerns garner the most attention? Why? What role does environmental activism play in social change? When do environmental bads become a concern for masses of people? How and when do people commit to change for the environment?

Specific attention will be paid to how environmental harms and social change happens. In the process of examining the social construction and social destruction of the environment and status quo related to our thoughts, beliefs and actions related to the environment, the course will address a number of other relevant topics, including: social inequity, environmental classism, environmental racism, eco-feminism, environmental activism, coping with climate crisis, political responses to environmental problems, and consequences of/for environmental policy.
