Course Description

This is the continuation of Intermediate Japanese (JPN 25A). Students will develop four communication skills in Japanese (listening, speaking, reading, and writing) in three modes of communication (interpersonal, interpretive, and presentational) to the low-mid intermediate level. Cultural and social backgrounds related to the topic and language use will also be discussed. As a general education (GE) core course, this course will also provide you with the basic skills of reading and writing in different genres.

Learning Outcomes

1. Course Goals and Course Learning Outcomes (CLO)

Students will learn to communicate in Japanese both in the oral and written modes within the intermediate low-mid ability range in interpersonal, transactional and in presentational situations. They will also deepen their understanding of cultural perspectives shared in Japanese society.

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- CLO 1: Understand spoken discourse and express themselves orally at the Intermediate Low/Mid of
 proficiency as defined by the <u>ACTFL Proficiency Guidelines</u> for speaking
 (<u>http://www.actfl.org/sites/default/files/pdfs/public/ACTFLProficiencyGuidelines2012_FINAL.pdf</u>)
 in three modes of communication in interpersonal situations, transactional situations, and presentational
 situations.
- CLO 2: Communicate in the written mode using *hiragana*, *katakana*, and more than 275 *kanji* at the Intermediate Low/Mid of proficiency as defined by the <u>ACTFL Proficiency Guidelines</u> for writing (http://www.actfl.org/sites/default/files/pdfs/public/ACTFLProficiencyGuidelines2012 FINAL.pdf)
- 3. CLO 3: Accurately and appropriately express themselves based on the knowledge and understanding of vocabulary, *kanji* characters, grammar, and common usages.
- 4. CLO 4: Understand customary practices and beliefs that are shared, presupposed and contested in Japanese society and develop sensitivity to cultural differences.

2. GE Learning Outcomes (GELO)

Upon successful completion of this Letters course (C2), students will be able to:

GELO 1: Recognize how significant works illuminate enduring human concerns.

Students will read 5 pieces of writing in a variety of genres and styles included in the textbook, such as book/story recommendations, biographies, survey reports, position papers, and diaries. During reading activities, students will be trained to recognize characteristics of the genre and the style. Students will demonstrate their understandings in reports and also in their own writing in the same genre.

Moreover, in the "*Kumo no ito* [A spider's thread]" assignment, the students will deepen their understanding of the message the story conveys. Their understanding will be demonstrated first in the worksheet written in Japanese, and then in the report written in English.

GELO2: Respond to such works by writing both research-based critical analyses and personal responses.

In the "*Kumo no ito*" assignment, students will analyze, with the help of reference materials (e.g., <u>https://ci.nii.ac.jp</u>), the literary work and deepen understanding of the author. On other reading materials, students are expected to demonstrate their understanding of the style of writing in the genre and cultural aspects reflected in the work. These understandings are demonstrated in their report in English.

GELO3: Write clearly and effectively.

Students write extensively in Japanese throughout the course in homework assignments, through in-class work, during writing workshops, and written exams totaling the equivalent of more than 1,500 characters. For example, in Lesson 16 students will learn to write a book recommendation on a piece of literary work (e.g., a novel, a short story, a collection of poems, a *manga* comic book, an *anime* episode, and a movie) of their own choice. The instructor and student peers will provide constructive feedback on the students' initial drafts in order to help them improve writing in the revised work. Written work in Japanese will be assessed in terms of the content, style, organization (coherence), variety and accuracy of language forms (vocabulary and grammar), appropriateness of language usage.

Course Requirements and Assignments

University's Credit Hour Requirement

Success in this course is based on the expectation that students will spend, for each unit of credit, a minimum of 45 hours over the length of the course (normally 3 hours per unit per week with 1 of the hours used for lecture) for instruction or preparation/studying or course related activities including but not limited to internships, labs, clinical practica. Other course structures will have equivalent workload expectations as described in the syllabus.

1. Classroom Active Participation:

<u>Absence</u>: If there is a legitimate excuse for an absence, you should inform the instructor beforehand, if possible, and submit a verifiable emergency or a doctor's note. In case of an absence, you are responsible for collecting class materials and informing yourself of the lesson contents covered during that period.

<u>Punctuality</u>: Punctuality is also important. Late entrances disrupt the class for everyone, so please show respect for your classmates and your instructor and be ready to begin working by 13:30. If you miss classes or come in late, you will not be able to fully participate in all the class activities, and thus will not gain full credit for participation.

<u>Active participation</u>: You are expected to actively participate in all classroom activities: by attentively listening to the instructor and other students, promptly responding to questions and prompts, seriously engaging in pair and group work, using Japanese unless use of English is inevitable, and so on. If you are neglecting your responsibility for actively participating in the class, you will not gain full credit for participation.

2. Homework (Workbook and other assignments):

You are expected to work on the part learned in class <u>each day</u>, using the lesson schedule as your guide. You have to submit your homework by the due date indicated in the lesson schedules. Mistakes on workbook will not be penalized, but you will not earn full credit for incomplete homework.

After you are done with one section or a page, you are responsible for correcting your answers with a colored pen, using the answer keys provided by the instructor. If your answers were correct, please write a check mark. When you provide your own answers, you cannot find a model answer in the answer keys. At these times when you are not certain about the correctness/appropriateness of your answers, please mark the parts with a question mark with a colored pen. Then, your instructor will check your answers and make necessary corrections <u>only</u> on those parts.

3. Writing Assignments:

There will be reading and writing workshops for each lesson, in which you will write reflections on the reading material in English and produce a written work in Japanese in the same genre. The submission of your in-class writing is required at the end of the writing workshop.

While you will constantly revise your writing during the workshop based on your peer's and the instructor's feedback, you are also expected to make revisions outside the class. Revised work of L16 writing should be uploaded as a "story recommendation" on the Discussion board on Canvas. Revised work of L18 writing has to be submitted as a part of the Midterm Exam. L22 writing should be revised so that you can prepare yourself for the writing portion of the final exam.

Specific guidelines will be provided for each assignment. Written works in Japanese (revisions and tests) will be assessed in terms of the content, style, organization (coherence), variety and accuracy of language forms (vocabulary and grammar), and appropriateness of language usage.

4. The "Kumo no ito" assignment

The students will read the story "*Kumo no ito*" together in a class and fill in the worksheet, in Japanese. This activity gives the students basic understanding of the story. Then, the students are expected to do research on the author and the story, and write a report on the story, in English. The depth of the analysis, the thoroughness of the research (need to cite the references used), and clarify of the writing (including organization and cohesiveness), are evaluated.

<u>Note on 2-4</u>: You are not allowed to copy any other persons' homework and other assignments. You will not earn full credit for incomplete assignments. You will receive **only a half credit** for late submissions of the assignments unless you have a verifiable emergency or a doctor's note. Late submission of assignment will NOT be accepted <u>after one week</u>.

There will be two oral performances for the instructor to assess your skills in listening, speaking and interacting in face-to-face situations. Specific instructions will be given one week before the due/performance day.

6. Lesson Tests [テスト]:

Each of the three lesson tests (for Lessons 16, 17 and 21) covers the contents of the lesson, including listening and reading comprehension, but excluding paragraph-length writing.

7. Midterm and Final Exams [試験]:

The midterm exam covers Lessons 16 through 18, with a larger weight on Lesson 18. The final exam assesses your cumulative competence, but it will have a larger weight on Lesson 22. Both exams will include paragraph-length writing, for which you will prepare yourself during writing workshops.

Note on 5-7 (oral performances, tests, and exams)

No make-up will be given without a valid, documented legitimate excuse for the absence.
