Course Description

Behavior, ecology and evolution of our closest animal relatives, the nonhuman primates. Interpretive emphasis toward broader understanding of human evolution and behavior.

We are members of an extremely interesting order of mammals, primates. This course will cover the various primate groups, highlighting their anatomy, behavior, evolution, and how understanding primates helps us to understand ourselves and our evolution.

Learning Outcomes

Upon successful completion of this course, students should be able to:

- 1) Name major primate taxonomic groups: prosimians, New World monkeys, Old World monkeys, and apes.
- 2) Describe the distribution, behaviors, and physical characteristics of each group.
- 3) Understand primates from an evolutionary perspectives, such as the anatomical adaptations to arboreality, the benefits of being in a social group, foraging strategies, different reproductive strategies of males and females, and life history strategies.
- 4) Appreciate that our knowledge of primate behaviors can help us to reconstruct the lifestyle of our early ancestors and further our understanding of human evolution.

Course Learning Outcomes (CLO)

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. CLO 1: Students will be able to name major primate taxonomic groups.
- 2. CLO 2: Students will be able to describe the distribution and physical characteristics for each group.

3. CLO 3: Students will be able to understand understanding primate adaptations (both anatomical and behavioral) can help us understand ourselves and our ancestors.

Required Texts/Readings

Falk D. 2000. Primate Diversity. W.W. Norton and Company.

Popular science book on primates of your choosing; approved by the professor.

Course Requirements and Assignments

EXAMS: There will be four quizzes and a final exam. The **comprehensive final** will be given on the scheduled final day. The final will only be given on the scheduled time; I will not schedule any early or late finals!

Taking tests for my classes:

- 1) Make sure to read each question carefully.
- 2) Make sure to arrive on time.
- 3) Put everything except your writing tools away.
- 4) Once I have handed out the first test and until the last test is turned in, there will be no talking permitted.
- 5) Always keep your eyes on your own papers.
- 6) Spelling counts. Misspelled answers will be marked as incorrect.
- 7) During the test, you can ask me questions if you need clarification on the question. To do this, please raise your hand and I will come over to you. If you have a question about the answer or about the meaning of a word that you should know (e.g., it is in your reading or I have used it in class), I will not answer the question.
- 8) Once you are finished, turn in your test and then you are free to leave.
- 9) Tests will be passed out the next class period and then we will review the answers. If you miss class, make sure to pick up the test the subsequent class period or during office hours.

ZOO VISIT: Each student must visit a zoo at least once during the semester and provide a ticket/receipt of entry along with a 2 to 4 page description of the primates observed at the zoo, which will be graded on style, grammar, and content.

BOOK REVIEW: Each student will choose a popular science book on primates, such as Gorillas in the Mist by Dian Fossey, the Bonobo and the Atheist by Frans de Waal, or For the Love of Lemurs by Patricia Chapple Wright, and write a 2 to 3 page book review. Book choice must be approved by me. Details for the book review will be discussed in class.

Both writing assignments will be submitted on turnitin.com.

There will be extra credit opportunities, which are based on preparedness for the review sessions.

<u>Make-up Work</u>: If you know in advance that you are unable to attend an exam, contact me to set up a time to take the exam prior to its scheduled date. Requests for extensions will be dealt on a case-by-case basis, but in most circumstances only students who were ill or have another valid documented excuse will be able to take an exam (including the final) or submit an assignment late. The final will be given on the scheduled time.
