- 3. Final exam. You will take one final exam consisting of short definitions, multiple choice, essay, and maps. (15% of the semester grade)
- 4. Term paper and Presentations. You will write a 5 pages ethnographic term paper, due the last regular class day. (15% of semester grade)
- 5. Participation. Over the course of the semester a great deal of class time will be dedicated to workshops and group activities. Your participation in these exercises will be evaluated by the course instructor. (10% of semester grade)

All assignments must be completed in order to pass. I will not accept late assignments nor will I administer makeup exams unless documents can be presented as evidence. For example, illness, death in family, jury duty, etc. Non assignments will be accepted via e-mail- I must receive hard copies of all assignments.
