Course Description

Modernity and Disease explores the effects of the modern world on human biology, with specific emphasis on adaptations to the last several decades of environmental changes. Topics include reproduction, diet, and infectious, geriatric and environmental diseases.

Learning Outcomes

During the semester, students will acquire knowledge on how human health is impacted by our genes, evolution and modern environmental.

- 1. CLO 1 identify trends of bone health that have occurred in the last 100 years.
- 2. CLO 2 identify human evolutionary adaptations that are incongruent with modern lifestyle.
