Course Description

Art 195 is an in-depth study focusing on contemporary topics in art and related subject matter. This course is for the procurement of the undergraduate BFA in Art degree. Within this course, the student will develop individual approaches, methodologies, and practices in the creation of art. This course will culminate in a final group show demonstrating professional competence in the students' area of concentration. Participation in the final exhibition with the approval of the student's advisory committee is required. Prerequisite: 30 units of upper division art, admission to the BFA program and ART 198, or ART 210 with advisor's approval.

This course offers the opportunity for individual exploration in the student's area of interest, including deep investigation of specific topics and processes in a single semester long project. The course will build into a final public group presentation of the work and is the final graduation requirement for the BFA Degree.

The development of the final project and installation will be supplemented with readings, group discussions, one on one meetings with faculty and guest presentations. Students in this class are responsible for the planning, organization, and execution of the final exhibition. Open dialog, critique, and discussion are vital to the student's success in this class. The final work can be executed in any medium, including print, video, animation, writing/publishing, web, or installation.

Course Format

This is a technology-intensive studio class. Lectures and labs are required. All course materials, submissions, and communication will be through the [Canvas Learning Management System course login website](#) at <http://sjsu.instructure.com>.

Final Exhibition and Project

The BFA final project is an open framework where students' individual works will be presented in a group exhibition alongside peers culminating in a final BFA group exhibition. Each project is inherently unique but individual students should provide comprehensive documentation on the development of the work as well as the final output. Over the course of the semester, students will work closely with faculty in the development of individual artworks that demonstrate expertise in their medium.

Course Learning Outcomes (CLO)

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

CLO1: Create professional level artwork that demonstrates conceptual depth and technical craftsmanship

CLO2: Successfully mount, install, and execute the final exhibition

CLO3: Work with fellow students to plan, organize and promote the final exhibition

CLO4: Conceptualize the final exhibition through detailed organization, critique, and discussion

CLO5: Design the final exhibition considering audience, artwork, and venue

Course Requirements and Assignments

This class will be run as a critique and studio. Students will be working in depth on their BFA projects for final presentation in the form of a group exhibition. We will be working for the semester to our final show. As a class you will be required to prepare your own work as well as organize and promote the final event. All corresponding press materials and final documentation will need to be divided up into small teams of students. The final installation should look professional and well polished. Students will also need to build and maintain a website for documentation of their final projects.

“Success in this course is based on the expectation that students will spend, for each unit of credit, a minimum of 45 hours over the length of the course (normally three hours per unit per week) for instruction, preparation/studying, or course related activities, including but not limited to internships, labs, and clinical practica. Other course structures will have equivalent workload expectations as described in the syllabus.”

Final Examination or Evaluation

Grading Criteria:

A: Excellence

The student fully commits to their project, both conceptually and technically. The final work created not only meets the criteria but it exceeds it. The student demonstrates a full understanding of the course content, and is able to apply that understanding in making original work with their own personal style.

B: Above Average

The student shows an understanding of the expected criteria for the assignment, and a sincere attempt to engage the conceptual framework. The quality of the project is good but not stellar. Technical understanding is demonstrated but has room for improvement.

C: Average

The student demonstrates a limited understanding of the conceptual framework of the assignment, and/or technical execution is underdeveloped with issues that could have been addressed in class or during office hours. The work would improve if more time and/or attention was dedicated to the project.

D: Below Average

The student only shows the slightest understanding of the intent of the assignment. There is a general failure to follow the intent and nuance of the assignment. The project can only be described as something that needs a great deal of work before it is considered something that is complete and meeting the requirements.
