Course Description

A beginning photography course that introduces students to fundamental aesthetic issues in image-making of black and white photography, as well as photographic technique utilizing digital cameras, electronic image processing, and "printing." Requires a DSLR type camera (or other approved digital camera) and Adobe Lightroom.

Have you ever given a moment to consider how photography touches every part of your life, from the day you were born to the family photographs on your cell phone, to the recent doctor's visit, or the powerful images from citizen journalists that sparked the Black Lives Matter movement? Photography, since its invention, has changed our lives in almost every way. How does photography serve as evidence, as history, as research, and as art?

This course is an introduction to Black and White Photography, emphasizing personal, social, and aesthetic concerns with the camera. Class lectures will introduce you to contemporary and historical photographers and various philosophical and technical approaches to the medium. We will be covering technical foundations that include camera controls, exposure techniques, and online presentations during the semester. Class lectures, assignments, readings, and project critiques encourage lively and thoughtful dialogue among class participants.

Course Format

We will meet over Zoom on Mondays and Wednesdays at the scheduled class time. Students are required to photograph out of class time.

Course Requirements and Assignments

“Success in this course is based on the expectation that students will spend, for each unit of credit, a minimum of 45 hours over the length of the course (normally three hours per unit per week) for instruction, preparation/studying, or course-related activities, including but not limited to internships, labs, and clinical practica. Other course structures will have equivalent workload expectations as described in the syllabus.”

Attendance

This course is lecture/technique-intensive, and attendance is required at all lecture and critique sessions. Do not schedule appointments, work, or any other commitment during this class time, as they will not be excused.

Critiques and Assignments

As one of the essential elements in art study, crits (critique) will play a vital role in this course. We will have a crit for each project, and attendance at crits are mandatory. You are required to show up for critiques prepared with your finished work. I will grade your assignments following the crits. I will accept late assignments only under unusual, extenuating, or emergency circumstances. Additionally, you must be prepared to discuss your work and your classmates' work in a manner that is educational, analytical, and objective. Participating in crit discussions are as essential as showing up for them. I will consider your level of participation in your final grade.

Grades are calculated on the below assignments and projects:

Four Photo Projects:	400 points, 40% (CLO4,5,6)
Six Canvas assignments:	300 points, 30% (readings discussions, and video tutorials, CLO3,4,5)
Final Portfolio:	200 points, 20% (CLO6)
Participation:	100 points, 10%

The criteria to earn an excellent grade:

- Technical proficiency in subject matter with the camera, Adobe Lightroom, and image presentation
- A thorough understanding and creative interpretation of all assignments
- Often going beyond the minimum shooting requirements for each assignment
- Exhibiting thorough verbal engagement in crits and class discussions.
- Punctual daily attendance
- Evidence that you have challenged yourself above and beyond the status quo

Participation:

Please keep in mind that for classes such as this one, active participation is essential. I require you to attend all class meetings, including those you are not presenting or having work critiqued. I expect you to actively participate in discussions about your peers' work, readings, lectures, etc. Taking chances will be highly rewarded! Your good energy is always evident, even if some of your projects don't reach the level of success you initially imagined. I would much prefer to reward you for "failing" at a higher level than succeeding at your current level of comfort.

- F: You didn't submit an assignment.
