Course Description

This course is an intermediate level photography course that emphasizes understanding and mastering craft and theory related to Color Photography. We will be dealing with the knowledge, skills, and ideas you were exposed to in previous introductory photography classes, refining what you have learned and expand your understanding of photography as a creative medium. My goal is to help you become skilled color photographers and learn to make pictures that grow in sophistication as you move through the course. The class is divided into workdays and lectures/crits.

As you know, photography has changed a lot in recent years due to digital cameras and increasingly powerful digital processing tools. Still, the basics of color photography and the properties of light (intensity, color, diffusion, etc.) have not changed, nor have the far more complex problems involved in using color in picture-making strategies. With the use of Photoshop and Lightroom, you will learn to photo edit, color correct, and print your photos. By midterm, each of you will possess the technical skills to produce high-quality color images. By the end of the term, you will have completed several projects (both assigned and self-generated) that will build your abilities at making effective, meaningful pictures.

Course Format

We will meet over Zoom on Mondays and Wednesdays at the scheduled class time. Students are required to photograph out of class time.

Course Requirements and Assignments

“Success in this course is based on the expectation that students will spend, for each unit of credit, a minimum of 45 hours over the length of the course (normally three hours per unit per week) for instruction, preparation/studying, or course-related activities, including but not limited to internships, labs, and clinical practica. Other course structures will have equivalent workload expectations as described in the syllabus.”

Attendance

This course is lecture/technique-intensive, and attendance is required at all lecture and critique sessions. Do not schedule appointments, work, or any other commitment during this class, as they will not be excused.

Critiques and Assignments

As one of the essential elements in art study, crits (critique) will play a vital role in this course. We will have a crit for each project, and attendance at crits are mandatory. You are required to show up for critiques prepared with your finished work. I will grade your assignments following the crits. I will accept late assignments only under unusual, extenuating, or emergency circumstances. Additionally, you must be prepared to discuss your work and your classmates' work in a manner that is educational, analytical, and objective. Participating in crit discussions are as essential as showing up for them. I will consider your level of participation in your final grade.

Grades are calculated on the below assignments and projects:

Four Photo Projects:	400 points, 40% (CLO1,2,3,4)
Six Canvas assignments:	300 points, 30% (readings, discussions, and video tutorials, CLO5,7)
Final Portfolio:	200 points, 20% (CLO6)
Participation:	100 points, 10%

The criteria to earn an excellent grade:

- Technical proficiency in subject matter with the camera, Adobe Lightroom, and image presentation
- A thorough understanding and creative interpretation of all assignments
- Often going beyond the minimum shooting requirements for each assignment
- Exhibiting thorough verbal engagement in crits and class discussions.
- Punctual daily attendance
- Evidence that you have challenged yourself above and beyond the status quo

Participation:

Please keep in mind that for classes such as this one, active participation is essential. I require you to attend all class meetings, including those you are not presenting or having work critiqued. I expect you to actively participate in discussions about your peers' work, readings, lectures, etc. Taking chances will be highly

rewarded! Your good energy is always evident, even if some of your projects don't reach the level of success you initially imagined. I would much prefer to reward you for "failing" at a higher level than succeeding at your current level of comfort.

Final Examination

- F: You didn't submit an assignment.
