Course Description:

PHOT 40:

Beginning Photography: A beginning photography course which introduces students to basic artistic aesthetic understandings in image making (primarily in black and white), as well as photographic technique utilizing digital cameras, electronic image processing and workflow. Now taught digitally, requires the operation of a DSLR type (digital) camera and access to Adobe Lightroom.

Course Format:

Technology Requirements:

You must have a digital camera, laptop, and internet access. For this class you will need extensive access to the use of a high-speed internet connection to access online class content. All assignments, readings, handouts, and relevant class info will be located on the CANVAS Portal. You are responsible for accessing these materials when made available (you can always print them out if you choose). Hard copies will **NOT** be distributed.

Course Goals:

With the rise of technology, most relevantly in our access to digital media, nearly everyone has the ability to take a photograph at any time. This class is about moving beyond the automatic features found in most consumer level camera phones and point-and-shoot cameras to explore how to make a photographic body of work that reflects your personal vision, understandings, and style.

We will begin the semester by learning the technical aspects of the camera including manual exposure, basic camera mechanics, the keystone elements of composition, and rudimentary editing using Adobe Lightroom. Once these topics have been covered, the remainder of the course will focus on developing your aesthetic and conceptual skills. With an understanding these technical skills give our conceptual work validity. With the completion of each project there will be a print day where in which we will hold our class critiques.

Some open lab time will be scheduled during class to allow you to work on your course projects, though you will find that you will need additional time to allow you to work at your own pace. Lab days are an important part of our schedule. It is on Lab days that students age given class time to get out into the world and shoot,

organize or catch up on course work, gather questions for the instructor before the deadline, lab time should be used wisely and is allotted to help ensure your success in the course.

Success in this course is based on the expectation that students will spend, for each unit of credit, a minimum of 45 hours over the length of the course (normally three hours per unit per week) for instruction, preparation/studying, or course related activities, including but not limited to internships, labs, and clinical practice. Other course structures will have equivalent workload expectations as described in the syllabus. Please be realistic about the amount of time needed to work your entire course load.

Final Examination or Evaluation:

Final exam will take place in the form of a cumulative portfolio and fall in line according to the Spring 2021 final exam schedule. The final portfolio will consist of 10 images that you believe best represent the work you set out to do during this course. This portfolio will be submitted in digital form via Canvas.

When Making an Image Please be Thinking About:

Visual Elements: Focus, lines, tones, space, composition.

Technical Elements: Light, aperture (depth of field), shutter speed, noise, editing.

Contextual Elements: Historical, theoretical, cultural, biographical.

Conceptual Elements: Ideas explored, connections made, creativity.

Grading Information:

Your final grade will be based on an average of 4 projects (40%), your final portfolio (20%), exam (5%), and class participation which includes the assignments *Our Understandings and Inspirations*. (35%). Take risks, break the rules, speak your mind, and take yourself and your work seriously. Hold yourself to a higher standard than what is expected of you - it will pay off in ways you cannot presently foresee.

♦**Outstanding:** Handing in all assignments on time and of outstanding quality. Actively participates in class critiques and discussions. Presents thoughtful and intelligent ideas in a clear, organized, and engaging manner. Work is among the very best. **A**

♦**Above Average:** Handing in all assignments on time, and of above average quality. Actively participates in class critiques and discussions. Presents ideas that are interesting and successfully presented; shows potential, but not necessarily distinctive. Work is roughly equal in quality to the majority of work completed by other students. **B**

♦**Average / Mediocre:** Handing in all assignments on time and of outstanding quality. Actively participates in class critiques and discussions. Achieves minimum requirements of the assignment, but not particularly clear, nor ambitious. Quality of work is below that of most other projects submitted. Reading/Writing Assignments & Optional Journaling:

In addition to your projects, I may give short classwork assignments, reading assignments, and discussion topic assignments, which may come up during class hours. These fall under your Class Participation grade. It is always a good idea to have a journal to sketch out or write down your ideas. Also have a dedicated space on your computer to keep track of this work in the form of a Photo40 folder.

Class Participation:

Participation is more than just showing up. Participation reflects the expectation that each student attends class; is on time; contributes positively to BOTH THE CANVAS DISCUSSION BOARDS AS WELL AS THE CLASSROOM LEARNING ENVIRONMENT by being attentive, by asking questions, by participating during critiques, and by working on the given assignment. In general, lecture and demonstrations will begin the class session followed by hands on projects. Which means if you are not present, you will miss the days demonstration. Class participation is also 20% of your grade. If you have an extenuating circumstance that is going to prevent you from attending, it is your responsibility to bring this to my attention.

Make Ups and Late Work:

Accepting late work reinforces bad habits for the students. When doing a job or for a client or creating work for a gallery - late work is unacceptable. So, in this respect, I would be doing you (a future professional) a disservice if I accept your late work. However, I do believe that every once in a while, extreme circumstances can sometimes prevent someone from doing their best work. If you find yourself in this situation please turn in what you have done so far This is your education, and you choose the level of commitment to each piece of art you create.

If you miss class, it is your responsibility to get yourself up to speed. I recommend finding a “buddy” who is a fellow student in the class or seek the instructors help outside of class during posted office hours. If you know you will be unable to attend a class, please send me an e-mail (preferably before the missed day), and if appropriate, I’ll do my best to let you know what you will be missing.

Extra Credit:

Attendance of the Tuesday Night Lecture Series and a two-paragraph response can be discussed if needed.
