Course Description

An overview of the anatomical and physiological bases of motor speech disorders, the assessment of motor speech disorders, and the best practices in clinical management of motor speech disorders. This is a three-unit graduate course designed to provide students with a knowledgeable and practical foundation in the area of motor speech disorders through collaborative, problem-based learning experiences and assignments.

Course Requirements and Assignments

SJSU classes are designed such that in order to be successful, it is expected that students will spend a minimum of forty-five hours for each unit of credit (normally three hours per unit per week), including preparing for class, participating in course activities, completing assignments, and so on. That is, expect to work six additional hours outside the classroom each week for a three-unit course.

- **Complete the assigned readings prior to class.** Graduate level courses typically require massive reading to provide enough background information, so that class time is primarily devoted to critical thinking, in-depth discussions and applications. *Tip:* Organize reading clubs to facilitate reading.
- **Assignments.** See the attached Course Calendar for exam/due dates and Assignment Description for specific instructions/rubrics.
 - **Participation (10%):** There will be various in-class activities/labs throughout the semester to facilitate learning. Participation is graded based on successful, on-time submission of the in-class activities/labs. [CLO 1-5]
 - **Neurological Condition Summary (20%):** You will *individually* provide a description of a unique disorder with a motor speech component in both written and oral formats (written summary and round-table presentation), and develop a clinically relevant education question. [CLO 2, 6, 7, 8]
 - **Exams (40%):** There will be 3 non-cumulative exams. Among which, two with the highest scores will count towards your final grade. [CLO 1, 3, 4]
 - **Case Study Project (30%):** You will work *in groups* to develop treatment plan for an assigned case, present the case in both oral (platform presentation) and written formats, and develop clinically relevant education questions. [CLO 4, 5, 7, 8]

NOTE that [University policy F69-24](http://www.sjsu.edu/senate/docs/F69-24.pdf) at <http://www.sjsu.edu/senate/docs/F69-24.pdf> states that “Students should attend all meetings of their classes, not only because they are responsible for material discussed therein, but because active participation is frequently essential to insure maximum benefit for all members of the class.
