  - Service use and needs
- Focus Groups
  - Staying healthy, fall, social relationships, service needs

### **Major Needs Expressed**

- Programs for physical activities, exercise, and fall prevention
- Access to physical exercise equipment and/or space
- Assistance to staff to provide programs for physical activity, socialization, fall prevention, service coordination to residents on an ongoing basis
