Writing skills appropriate to majors in economics of lucid expression in essays, reports, and other types of communication

Course Goal

To ensure all students who complete the course with a passing grade can write economics reports concisely, clearly, and correctly in grammar, syntax, and overall organization of ideas.

Course Requirements and Assignments

ECON 100W has an 8,500-word minimum writing requirement as an area Z course. This requirement will be met through the completion of various writing assignments.

Because this course is structured as a research working group, students are expected to complete all readings before coming to class. Participation is a substantial part of the course grade.

Success in this course is based on the expectation that students will spend, for each unit of credit, a minimum of 45 hours over the length of the course (normally three hours per unit per week) for instruction,

preparation/studying, or course related activities, including but not limited to internships, labs, and clinical practica. Other course structures will have equivalent workload expectations as described in the syllabus.

Final Examination or Evaluation

This course has a culminating final project that consists of a 3,000-word research paper, a 1,500-word annotated bibliography, and an 8- to 10-minute presentation, including a question and answer portion.

This course also has an optional final exam. It will be comprehensive, but students may take it if they wish to drop their midterm score. If a student opts to take the final and drop the midterm exam, the final exam will be 15% of the course grade, whether the student performs better or worse on the final than the midterm.

Students will have class sessions devoted entirely to work to revise their Research Topic Proposal, Literature Review, and Initial Findings papers. During these sessions, I will walk around to answer questions and/or

address concerns. Each revised paper must be submitted to Canvas as a separate document from the final draft of the paper; I will give more details on these assignments in class and in the prompts for the assignments. I will grade each revised paper and final draft separately.

Rubrics for writing assignments will be distributed with the prompts.

Students will lose points each day an assignment is submitted late: 10% of possible points the first day late, 20% of possible points the second day late, and 30% of possible points the third day late. Students will receive no credit for assignments submitted more than three days late.

The participation grade will work as follows:

- 15% of the course grade (150 points) will be earned during normal class days. Days possible to earn participation points are indicated on the course schedule. Students are expected to attend having read the assigned material(s). Most class meetings will involve class discussion of topics. If a student is called on and cannot contribute to the conversation or discuss something from the reading for that day, the student will lose 3% of the available 15%. This may occur no more than 5 times during the semester. Students may miss up to two days of class without impacting their participation grade.
- 5% of the course grade (50 points) will be earned during a library day, which is detailed on the course schedule. Students are expected to come to the library day with ideas about research they want to do and will submit a correctly formatted page of references that they found using the tools discussed during the library day.

I do not use the Canvas grade as the official course grade due to various issues in how it calculates grades. Instead, I keep my own gradebook on my computer using the weighting and points indicated in this syllabus. Students may ask me for their official course grade at any point during the semester.

Students can earn up to 3% extra course credit (30 points) by attending Provocative Lectures and submitting a summary for each. If students cannot attend a Provocative Lecture, they may watch a previous Provocative Lecture and submit a summary of it but must first email me letting me know of the scheduling conflict and proposing a previous Provocative Lecture to watch. Summaries for watched Provocative Lectures are due the same days as summaries for attended Provocative Lectures. I will not accept any late extra credit assignments.

Classroom Protocol

I will begin class at the scheduled start time each day. Coming to class late will result in missed material and potentially missed participation credit—if you arrive to class late and are called on to speak before you arrive, you will lose possible points for that day. If you must come to class late (or need to leave early), please, sit at the back of the class to avoid disrupting your fellow students.

If you wish to use an audio recorder, ask for my permission first. Laptops and tablets are allowed to be used for taking notes, but using them gives me permission to call upon you at any time during class to answer questions. Use of headphones in class is strictly not permissible.

The classroom should have an environment for group learning. Please, respect your classmates by not interrupting, avoiding offensive language, and silencing all electronic devices.
