Course Description

Examines the economic effects of legal institutions, existing and proposed, and application of economic analysis to the law. Evaluation of the interactions between legal and economic principles and introduction to standard topics such as property rights, contracts, liability, and torts.

Course Learning Outcomes (CLO)

Upon successful completion of this course, students will:

1. Have a deeper understanding of the law and economics literature.
2. Be able to apply economic analysis to proposed and existing legal rulemaking.
3. Analyze and present concepts and findings in law and economics.

Course Requirements and Assignments

Homework Assignments

There will be four homework assignments during the semester which students will present in class. You may work on the homework assignments together. Homework questions will be posted on Canvas one week before they are due. Late homework will not be accepted, including late arrival to class. Students who decline to present a homework question will receive zero credit for the assignment.

Weekly Questions

Students will submit two thoughtful questions on each week's readings ahead of class. Students may not use AI to generate their questions; the point of the exercise is to develop your original thoughts on the material. Questions must reflect the readings for that week and are due in Canvas Discussions before class.

Seminar Participation

Socratic seminars will take place at the end of class each week, during which active student participation will be evaluated and graded. The seminar format has a long traditional in educational institutions and I will provide more resources and guidance on the format during class. The seminar is not a debate with two debaters taking sides. Instead, it is a group dialogue where students engage in thoughtful interrogation of ideas. You should have your readings and notes with you for seminar discussion. Active participation during the seminar is required to be eligible for credit.

Midterm Exam

There will be one midterm exam in this course, completed in class using a standardized '[Green Book](#)'. Green Books may be purchased from the SJSU bookstore or other academic retailers. Students are responsible for bringing their own Green Books to the exam and the exam must be completed using a Green Book. If a student must miss an exam, this should be discussed with me at least one week ahead of time. In the event of an emergency, students should email me immediately and provide documentation ASAP. Please note that if a student misses an exam and I have not accepted a student's excuse, a grade of "0" will be given. If the absence is excused, the weight of the missing exam will be distributed across the remaining course material.

Final Exam

Students will complete a final exam at the end of this semester. The final exam will also be completed in class using a standardized '[Green Book](#)'. Green Books may be purchased from the SJSU bookstore or other academic retailers. Students are responsible for bringing their own Green Books to the exam, and exams must be completed using a Green Book.
