Course Description

Examination of works of poetry, creative nonfiction and short fiction as expressions of human intellect and imagination, to comprehend the historic and cultural contexts and recognize issues related to writing by ~~men and women~~ PEOPLE of diverse cultural traditions. Students will write poetry, creative nonfiction and short fiction (edited from the Course Description).

Course Requirements

Assignments Details & Grading

Readings & Media (Read, Watch & Annotate) 0 Points

Students will be given weekly reading or viewing assignments where they will be required to take good notes, use what they've learned from lectures to annotate the poetry and store their notes for reference later. These assignments have no point value, but they are cumulative and part of the scaffold of learning.

Participation in Workshops 100 Points

Students are expected to attend class and actively participate in class discussions, performances and workshops. Students are allowed 3 missed classes before their grade is affected. 6 Assigned Emulations (5 required, 50 Points Each)

Students will be asked to create works of poetry that emulate the works that they are reading/viewing. This will be an informed creation. These pieces will be dispersed for workshop.

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Writing Warm-up Portfolio 250 Points

Every class students are offered writing warm-up prompts and are given time to write. At the end of the semester, students will turn in a portfolio containing 10 (25 points each) of their favorite self-edited pieces.
