A character analysis is a detailed evaluation of a character. Writing a character analysis is “an effective way to make sense of, and then offer some conclusions about, the significance of the character” (*Writing* 42). For this assignment, choose a minor character from *Frankenstein* and write a character analysis.

You may not use any outside resources for this explication, except the Harmon handbook or a dictionary – this assignment is really about you and your poem.
