

SUMMARY

Hunter Joy Charmand is a disciplined member of Apex, perhaps the only one to strive for the purpose of defending others and making them feel protected. With her otherworldly hounds at her side, she has the advantage of a sort of magic to aid her in her fight.

Lackey's style varies on the specific subgenre of the story, *Hunter* speaks directly from the character Joy's perspective on how she's grown and developed her skills as a hunter and what she comes to expect from the world, giving the reader those same expectations. While the general idea of the plot is all too familiar, some saying it's reminiscent of *Hunger Games*, it holds a different charm, making Lackey's take on the trope unique and appealing to young readers.
