- An economic purpose of higher education
- 2. **Write.** On an index card, write down responses to these questions: What are your reasons for completing a college? Do your reasons resemble any of the purposes you read about in the article? Why or why not? Bring your card to class.
- 3. Print and bring a hard copy of your major curriculum sheet to class.

# **Learning Objectives**

## Advanced objectives

- Students will be able connect two purposes of Higher Ed with their reasons for completing a college degree.
- Students will be able to express two purposes of Higher Ed as their reasons for completing a college degree.

### Activities & deliverables

- 1. Create a two-minute video to introduce yourself to the class.
- 2. Agree to some basic online classroom norms after viewing this <u>slideshow</u>. Before going to Flip Grid complete the agreement on the last slide.
- 3. Go to our <u>Class Grid</u>. It will ask you to sign in with either your Google or Microsoft email. Select **Microsoft**, which will log in with your CPP email login.
- 4. Once in the Class Grid, read the instructions completely. Script or rehearse what you will say, making sure it can be done in no more than two minutes (the camera automatically stops at two minutes).
  - o Also, be sure you are in a relatively quiet place without interruptions or distractions.
  - o Control for too much visual stimuli (posters, pictures, TV or computer screen, moving or colorful objects) in the background.
- 5. When you are ready to record, scroll down and click on the green circle with the plus icon and follow the instructions. Watch this short introductory <u>video</u> on how to use Flipgrid.



- 6. Once your video is posted to the topic, you're done recording! If you are unsatisfied with your video, you can delete it and try again. Scripting and rehearsal should minimize the need to do this.
- 7. Now listen to at least two of your peers' videos and reply with a 1-minute video each, welcoming them and discussing one or two ideas shared in their video.
- 8. Once you have replied, you're done!
