Papers

Students will complete 3 papers outside of class. Each paper will be 6-8 typewritten, double spaced pages with normal margins and fonts. Papers will describe a cultural, ethnic or religious practice of any group that would be useful in furthering police-community awareness. Each paper **must** be turned in by the beginning of class on the due date. Papers will be graded on relevance, organization, completeness and reference notation. Each paper will include a minimum of three scholarly references in the APA format. Grammar and spelling will account for 20% of each paper. Late papers will not be accepted.

Individual Presentation

Each student will make one presentation about a law enforcement agency by visiting the agencies website for information. Prepare an outline for the presentation and provide enough copies for the instructor and other students.

Exams

The Mid-term and Final exams will cover all material presented prior to the exam including chapter reading assignments, lecture and information provided by guest speakers. Test reviews will provide a general overview of the material covered in the exam.
