Course Description

Analysis of the nature and extent of crime, including causation and prevention. Descriptions of offenses, criminal typologies and victim surveys. Evaluation of various control and prevention strategies.

Prerequisite: JS 10, JS 12, JS 25 or FS 11 Pre/Co-requisite: JS 100W

Note: Must achieve a grade of "C" or better to fulfill Justice Studies major requirements.

1. Confidently discuss criminological theories, including history, limitations, and applications of theories.
2. Apply criminological theories to real life situations.
3. Write a research paper evaluating and applying criminological theories.
4. Make critical assessments of and draw logical conclusions about readings on criminological theories.
5. Students should read, write, and contribute to discussion at a skilled and capable level.

Course Requirements and Assignments

Participation

This class should be engaging for everyone, and therefore relies on student participation. All students will be expected to have read all assigned readings and completed any assignments before participating in a weekly discussion board. Participation in online discussions are expected to be thoughtful and thorough, and should show student understanding of the assigned topic.

Reading Responses

Students will write weekly reading responses to the required readings. You will choose one of the discussion questions listed at the end of one of the chapter assigned for that week to reflect on the reading. Reading responses are due on Tuesdays as listed on Canvas. Late work will not be accepted. Reading responses should be no less than one (1) page and no more than two (2) pages long (not counting any headers or footnotes), and must be written in formal English, in Times New Roman, 12pt. font, and double-spaced. If in-text citations and references are used, they must be in APA-style formatting.

Please make sure to write the question you chose at the top of the page (this reciting of the question does not count as part of your page requirement) and do not put your name or the class information on the paper.

Midterm

The midterm will consist of multiple choice and short answer questions and will cover all materials assigned from week 2 to week 8. The midterm will take place on Tuesday 10/16.

Weekly Discussion Boards

1. You will be expected to participate in each week's discussion board by responding to the posted discussion question(s) at least once and responding to one of your peer's at least once. Your responses should be thoughtful, analytical, insightful and respectful. It is great to be able to argue a point and have an opinion in a discussion forum, however, it is important to do so in a respectful, unoffensive manner.

- In randomly assigned groups you will be assigned to moderate one of the weekly discussion boards by completing a series of tasks, including: (1) summarizing the theories discussed in that week's readings (2) connecting the theories to the video assigned that week (3) generating discussion questions, and (4) providing real-world examples applying the theories. You will manage the board that entire week, by responding to your peers, asking follow-up questions, and responding to any questions posed to you as the moderators. Each member of the moderating group will respond to at least 3 student comments with thoughtful follow-up questions or responses. Your discussion of the material should be thoughtful, engaging, and analytical and invite participation by all students. For grading, you will receive both individual and group grades.

Final Examination or Evaluation

Each student will write a research paper on a topic of their choice pertaining to a criminological theory, using at least six (6) peer-reviewed journal articles that were not used in class. To find peer-reviewed journal articles, visit the King Library's journal database at <http://libguides.sjsu.edu/az.php>. The best source for full-length, peer-reviewed articles is Academic Search Complete. Students must reference their journal articles in APA-style formatting. Students should refer to an APA style guide or the Online Writing Lab (OWL) from Purdue University at <https://owl.english.purdue.edu/owl/section/2/10/> if unclear about APA guidelines. Students must choose their topics by the end of week 9 and clear them with me. A handout detailing the expectations, content, formatting, and submission requirements will be provided on Canvas. The research paper is due on Canvas through turnitin at the scheduled time for the final exam.

“Success in this course is based on the expectation that students will spend, for each unit of credit, a minimum of 45 hours over the length of the course (normally 3 hours per unit per week with 1 of the hours used for lecture) for instruction or preparation/studying or course related activities including but not limited to internships, labs, clinical practice.
