Course Description

Structure and functions of the court system. Emphasizes attorneys' and judges' roles and the court process. Examination of federal and state legislative, executive and judicial branch actions, including Supreme Court decisions in civil and criminal cases.

Note: Must achieve a grade of "C" or better to fulfill Justice Studies major requirements.

Course Requirements and Assignments

Homework Assignments -- Homework Assignments (HW) are designed to help enhance your learning of the week's topic by: reviewing key information, learning new details about a topic, practicing the application of a rule, and/or making connections among concepts and readings. Homework assignments are completed at home and are designed so that you can complete them without having attended lecture. You must upload the homework to CANVAS by 12pm on the due date. Late submissions will incur a 10% penalty for each day late; after 12pm on the due date counts as day one.

On-call Q&A(2) – On two (2) dates in the semester you will be called upon in class to answer questions about the material covered that day. You will be given themes, terms or questions in advance to help prepare you for questions that you may be asked. Your on-call dates have been assigned in advance. I will accommodate reschedule requests received by **Aug 29**. If you do not

attend lecture on the date shown, you cannot receive points for the Q&A, even in the event of illness or emergency. Each On-call Q&A day is worth 10 points.

Lecture Image – On one (1) day in the semester you will present to the class an image that you believe captures the essence of one or more topics of discussion in the previous two lecture periods. In addition to your in-class statement to the class, you must also submit a one-paragraph written statement on CANVAS. Your date has been assigned in advance. I will accommodate reschedule requests received by **Aug 29**. If you do not attend lecture on the date shown, you cannot receive points for this assignment, even in the event of illness or emergency. Your lecture image day is worth 20 points.

Midterm – There is a multiple-choice midterm that is worth approximately 75 points.

Court Observations (2) -- Twice during the semester, you must attend a local court facility and turn in written observations. You must attend on your own time. Directions for each assignment will be given in class. Each observation is worth 25 points.

Jury Deliberation Exercise -- There will be an in-class exercise that highlights research on jury deliberations.

Final Paper -- At the end of the course you turn in an essay that discusses alternative court processes explored in the film Circle Up. The final essay is worth 75 points.
