Course Format

Course Description

This survey course introduces students to the profession of forensic science. Topics include the history and sub-disciplines of forensic science, and the scientific methods and analytical instrumentation used for the recognition, documentation, collection, preservation, and analysis of physical evidence.

Disclaimer: This is an adult level course that may cover graphic criminal cases/discussions/topics. Most of the course material will not be censored. Under no circumstances are students permitted to take photos/screenshots of any of the course materials, slides or photos. Outlines will be provided/accessible via Canvas for each lecture pertaining to the topic that will be discussed. Students are prohibited from recording class activities (including class lectures, office hours, advising sessions, etc.), distributing class recordings, or posting class recordings. Materials created by the instructor for the course (syllabi, lectures and lecture notes, presentations, etc.) are copyrighted by the instructor. Course Goals and Student Learning Objectives (LO)

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to [LO1-5]:

- 1. critically analyze the forensic sciences used in today's criminal justice system and explain issues that arise in our courts due to the CSI effect
- 2. Differentiate and explain the roles of forensic and investigative personnel, their separate duties and how they work together, and articulate a realistic perspective of the forensic sciences.
- 3. Summarize the history of forensic science, the structure and organization of crime labs, and the sub-disciplines and contributing sciences of forensic science.
- 4. Explain the fundamental principles and concepts of forensic science
- 5. Describe the rules of evidence

Assignments

1. MIDTERM – This will be held in the lecture time. It will be only 1.5 hours long and will be worth 25% of the total grade. It will be based on the seminars and readings and will be in the form of short answers/multiple choice/true or false.

2. FINAL – This will be held during the final exam period and will cover the second part of the course, and will include all seminars and readings following the midterm. It will be three hours and worth 25% of your total grade.

3. SEMINAR EXERCISES and PARTICIPATION will be assigned in class and will be worth 25% of your final grade. These exercises can range from weekly assignments to in class activities. Due to this, regular attendance is required for successful completion of this course.

4. One LITERATURE REVIEW paper and OUTLINE is also required. This should be 5 pages long – no shorter and not much longer (before references), double spaced. Your paper should be on a forensic science of your choice (suggestions will be offered in class) and should focus on explaining the science (not too much on techniques). The paper is worth 15% and is due (week 15). An outline must be submitted (week 11) and is worth 10% of your mark and combined with the paper, they are worth 25% of your final grade. All assignments must be completed to fulfill the requirements of the course and class attendance is required (as this is a scheduled class for M at 9 am)

She then went on to complete a M.A. in Criminology at SFU where she specialized in constant and fluctuating temperature effects in forensic entomology. During her Ph.D. studies, also at SFU, Dr. Warren developed innovative techniques to advance current techniques used at crime scenes to age developing insects on decomposing remains. For this research, she was awarded the prestigious Dean's Convocation Gold Medal.
