# **Course Description**

Introduction to Justice Studies examines the historical and philosophical development of the justice system; description, analysis and evaluation of criminal justice agencies, and explores the relationship between theory and practice in the United States.

Note: Must achieve a grade of "C" or better to fulfill Justice Studies major requirements.

# **Course Requirements and Assignments**

Success in this course is based on the expectation that students will spend, for each unit of credit, a minimum of 45 hours over the length of the course (normally 3 hours per unit per week with 1 of the hours used for lecture) for instruction or preparation/studying or course related activities including but not limited to internships, labs, and clinical practica. Other course structures will have equivalent workload expectations as described in the syllabus.

Your grade is derived from work in four (4) categories:

Homework Assignments (11) -- Homework assignments are designed to review and enhance your learning of the week's topic by: reviewing key information, learning new details about a topic, practicing the application of a rule, and/or making connections among concepts and readings. They include activities such as answering short essay questions, listing facts or concepts, and completing charts and tables. Homework assignments are completed at home. You must complete your assignment before midnight on the assigned date. (CLOs 1, 2, 3)

*On-Call Participation* (5) – Five times during the semester, you will be called upon to answer questions during the lecture hour. You will sign up in advance for these dates on the CANAVS Calendar.

Quizzes (4) -- Quizzes are designed to test your comprehension of a topic. There are two quizzes during Unit 1 and one quiz each for Units 2 and 3. Each quiz is approximately 25 multiple choice questions. (CLOs 1, 2, 3)

*Final Exam* (1) -- The final exam covers Unit 4. The final exam is approximately 50 multiple choice questions. (CLOs 1, 2, 3)
