Justice Studies Area: JS 153 is an elective in Justice Studies Area A.

Note: To be accepted for credit towards a degree in Justice Studies, a grade of "C" or better in this course is required.

Catalog Description: Explores how crime and justice are experienced by individuals over time. The nature and extent of offending and victimization at various ages across the life course is examined. A critical consideration of the criminal career paradigm is also provided.

Section Specific Description and Student Learning Objectives: Popular conceptions of "criminals" tend towards broad caricatures of criminal types. To name a few; the "troubled teenage" delinquent; the skid row addict; the mobster, the good-hearted prostitute, and the "professional thief." While media portrayals (both fiction and non-fiction) and folklore concerning "criminals" often contain a kernel of truth, there is a strong bias towards attributing their criminal activities to a stable personality trait or psychological defect of one form or another while neglecting or ignoring the role of the environment and life-experiences in the onset, persistence, and desistence from a criminal career. To correct this misconception, readings with in-depth descriptions of individual criminal careers are part of the course.

Required Readings: At the time of writing, there are two required monographs for this course.

Great Pretenders: Pursuits and Careers of Persistent Thieves 1996 Shover, Neal. Westview Press

Other Readings: Will be assigned on CANVAS.

Course Requirements:

Students are evaluated on the basis of four types of material. Following a brief description of each, the course weighting and other grading policies follow.

Assignment Descriptions

1) Quizzes: Quizzes will consist primarily of short-answers but may include multiple choice as well. Quizzes consist of material assigned or presented in class back to the previous quiz. Expect to spend between 20 and 40 minutes on each quiz.

2 Final Exams: The Final exam has the same format as the quizzes, but is longer and takes place at the time scheduled by the university.

3) "Outsiders" paper: Instructions distributed on CANVAS.

4) Term Paper: Instructions distributed on CANVAS.

5) Participation: Based on active contributions in ZOOM meetings or discussions. Participation credit will be given only if the total of the other material is equal to or greater than 70%.
