Course Description

A multidisciplinary study of law enforcement from the early 1800's to the present. Focus on significant studies in relation to the role of police and analysis of current models and practices. Prerequisites include the following courses: JS 10, 12, 25, or FS 11, and upper division standing. Co-requisite course is: JS 100W. Note: Students must achieve a grade of "C" or better (not C-) to fulfill Justice Studies major requirements. 3 Units.

Course Requirements and Assignments

"Success in this course is based on the expectation that students will spend, for each unit of credit, a minimum of 45 hours over the length of the course (normally three hours per unit per week) for instruction, preparation/studying, or course related activities, including but not limited to internships, labs, and clinical practica. Other course structures will have equivalent workload expectations as described in the syllabus."

"Faculty members are required to have a culminating activity for their courses, which can include a final examination, a final research paper or project, a final creative work or performance, a final portfolio of work, or other appropriate assignment."

- 1) Weekly chapter quizzes (14): Each chapter is accompanied by a 20-question, 20-point multiple choice quiz that reviews the main contents of the chapter. (CLOs 1-4)
- 2) Weekly premium video quizzes (14): Each chapter is accompanied by series of videos and accompanying questions (multiple choice and short essay) centered around current events in policing. (CLOs 1-5)
- **3)** Slideshow Presentation: Your culminating project at the end of the semester is a slideshow presentation on a policing topic of your choosing that draws on the following sources: (1) at least five academic sources not including the textbook, (2) at least one documentary film, and (3) at least one news article written in the last five years. The slideshow presentation may be composed by yourself or with up to one other student. Individual slideshow presentations must be a minimum of 20 slides, including the title slide and references slide. Partnered presentations must be a minimum of 35 slides and must include two additional academic sources and one additional documentary film. On April 18, you will submit a proposal for the presentation and the professor will provide feedback.
