  solving tangible social problems; (d) somehow contributes to our collective understanding of concepts and approaches to
  "justice," however defined (social justice, criminal justice, community justice, and so forth). (CLO1)
- 2. Demonstrate their ability to present scholarly work to an audience of their peers. (CLO2)
- 3. Demonstrate a working understanding of "evidence-based" approaches to social problems and public policy. As a culminating skill set in our program, students should demonstrate their ability to apply social scientific (and otherwise rational) forms of reasoning, argumentation, research, and support in forming any particular worldview or position in the pursuit of "justice" and addressing social problems in our communities/societies. - 4. Demonstrate their ability to undertake a critical analysis of a contemporary problems relevant to justice studies. (CLO4)
- 5. Students should read, write, and contribute to discussion at a skilled and capable level that appropriately reflects the cumulating experience of their justice studies major. (CLO5)

### Participation (CLO2, CLO3, CLO4, CLO5)

This class should be engaging for everyone, and therefore relies on student participation. All students will be expected to have read all assigned readings and completed any assignments before class, to be able to successfully participate in class discussions. Some aspects of weekly class discussions will be assigned to the discussion audience for participation credit. Come to class ready to engage, debate, and discuss! Your participation grade will not be based on simply being present in the classroom but on meaningful participation. Review the participation rubric on Canvas for detailed grading information.

### Class discussion facilitation (CLO2, CLO3, CLO4, CLO5)

To demonstrate the ability to critically analyze contemporary problems in the justice system, as well as place such issues in the larger sociological context, each student will be responsible for facilitating one in-class discussion for a specific textbook chapter and topic. Students must familiarize themselves with the reading assignments as well as do additional research necessary for their in-class discussion facilitation. There are multiple components to facilitating in class discussions, with the facilitator in charge of most preparation and research (some aspects will be assigned to the discussion audience for participation credit).

#### Weekly Discussion Facilitation Support (CLO2, CLO3, CLO4, CLO5)

To support classroom discussions facilitated by peer moderators, every week, each student must submit 2 news items that relate to the discussion topics, as well as 2 discussion question. News items must show that you can place contemporary issues in justice into the larger sociological context and therefore cannot be criminal justice news. They must fall into one of the following categories: social justice news, political news, and/or international news. News items have to be current news (2022/2023) and discussion questions must be thoughtful and open-ended. Further instructions and expectations will be discussed.

# Written Assignments: Annotated bibliography (CLO1, CLO2, CLO3, CLO4, CLO5)

Using your assigned topic, thoroughly research the SJSU library database for scholarly, peer-reviewed articles. Through your research you will narrow down your topic based on your interests. Fifteen (15) appropriate articles will then be compiled into an annotated bibliography.

# Written Assignments: Introduction & Thesis (CLO1, CLO2, CLO3, CLO4, CLO5)

Students will write an introduction followed by a thesis on a topic assigned to them by the instructor, based on the articles gathered in their annotated bibliography. Introductions must be engaging and concise. Theses must be short, clear and concise.

### Written Assignments: Research Paper (CLO1, CLO2, CLO3, CLO4, CLO5)

Students will write one comprehensive research paper, based on the research conducted at the beginning of the semester.

Students will use their previously compiled reference page, as well as their introduction and thesis, with revisions based on previously received instructor feedback. Additionally, students will write a literature review, discussion and conclusion to be included in their research paper.

#### Research Presentation (CLO2, CLO3, CLO4, CLO5)

Students will create a presentation of their research paper. Your discussion of the material should be thoughtful and analytical, and invite participation by all students. Further instructions and expectations will be discussed.
