Course Description

The purpose of this course is to provide students with an examination of the legal and ethical environment in which professional and amateur sports presently operate. Included will be a broad discussion of ethics, aspects of contract law, labor law, contract law and antitrust law, as they apply to the sport industry. Through knowledge dissemination (lectures), class participation (discussions and presentations), and professional inquiry, a variety of information regarding legal and ethical aspects of sport is introduced.

Course Goals and Student Learning Objectives

Upon completion of Kinesiology 281, through well-prepared assignments and presentations, a high level of class participation, and satisfactory completion of examinations, the student will be able to:

- Understand the basics of the U.S. legal system.
- Explain the types of law that impact the management of sport organizations.
- Define and apply key legal terminology and fundamental concepts relevant to various areas of law including tort, contract, constitutional, antitrust, labor, and intellectual property law.
- Evaluate the potential liabilities associated with the management of a sport business and prepare a risk management plan.
- Understand and discuss major ethical theories and how these theories can be used to inform sport management practice.

Definition of a Credit Hour

Success in this course is based on the expectation that students will spend, for each unit of credit, a minimum of forty-five hours over the length of the course (normally 3 hours per unit per week with 1 of the hours used for lecture) for instruction or preparation/studying or course related activities including but not limited to internships, labs, clinical practica. Other course structures will have equivalent workload expectations as described in the syllabus.

As an example, the expectation of work for a 3-credit course is 150-minutes of direct faculty instruction and *six hours of out-of-class student work each week*.

Teaching Strategies

The course will be delivered in a hybrid manner via lecture with PowerPoint slides and through synchronous Zoom lectures. Class discussions (both in class and via Canvas) linked to relevant topics may be used to enhance lectures.

Assignments and Grading Policy

Course Evaluation

Discussion Questions (10 points) (PLO: 1, 2, 3)

Students will be required to post 2 discussion questions based on the readings of the week to Canvas by 1:00pm on the day of class meetings. Students should be aware of the questions their fellow classmates have asked and not repeat previously posted questions/material.

Business Memos/Executive Summary (20 points) (PLO: 1, 2, 3)

Following each chapter/class lecture, students will write an informative business memo/executive summary. The memo should be written as if you are providing an archive of the weekly information. The memo must demonstrate a clear grasp of the legal/ethical concepts discussed in each chapter/class.

Papers must be typed in Times New Roman 12 pt. font, double-spaced, one-inch margins, and one-two pages in length. Only Microsoft Word documents will be accepted (.docx or .rtf). Late submissions will not be accepted. Plagiarism will be considered a violation of the University Academic Honor Code. This includes copy/paste from another source and plagiarizing oneself. All papers must be original work for this class. Further information regarding this assignment will be posted on Canvas.

Case Brief (20 points) (PLO: 1, 2, 3)

Working in groups of two (2), students will select a legal case (and receive approval from the instructor) to research, read and analyze. Following this analysis, one student from the group will submit the group's written case brief, or summary of the case. Additional information about this assignment, including how to write a case brief and a rubric discussing how the assignment will be graded, will be available on Canvas.

The case brief must be typed in Times New Roman 12 pt. font, single-spaced, one-inch margins, and two-three pages in length. Only Microsoft Word documents will be accepted (.docx or .rtf). See the course calendar for the due date. Late submissions will not be accepted.

Presentation (15 points) (PLO: 1, 2, 3)

Students will work in groups and will be required to present an assigned chapter from the textbook to the class. This presentation will serve as the daily lecture and will form the basis from which the week's class discussion will be drawn. Each group will be responsible for no less than 45 minutes of class time. Each group will be evaluated on the thoroughness of their presentation, the quality of the material presented, and their ability to engage the students with questions/materials/audio visuals, etc.

Final Paper (35 points) (PLO: 1, 2, 3)

Students will complete a 15 page minimum paper informed by sport ethics/law scholarship. The instructor must approve of the topics for the final paper by week 4. Papers must be no more than 20 pages in length, double-spaced, 12-point Times New Roman font, one-inch margins. All writing must be utilizing current APA style guidelines, and utilize a minimum of 15 scholarly references. Rubric available on Canvas.
