## Chair's Message...

## Please vote for us in November!

We are at an interesting stage in the history of the Department of Kinesiology. We've gone from 275 majors in fall 2001 to over 600 at the time of writing. We've also doubled the number of graduate students, to right around 100. Our total number of students (which includes non-majors in General Education and Activity classes), has increased from 486 to 750 over the same time period. So, by any measure, this is a very popular subject of study these days.

It's been a challenge to get students into classes and move them along to timely graduation and this has meant many summer and winter class offerings, and second sections of several major classes. With the great faculty we have, however, much is possible!

The downside continues to be our facilities. If you were a student here in the 1930s or later, you wouldn't find a whole lot of change, although we have been extremely successful in getting funding for much-needed new equipment by going over target on student numbers. And this is where you come in! Although we won't know for sure until perhaps the end of June, there will likely be General Obligation Bond Measure on the November ballot and I urge you please to vote for it, and ask all your friends to please vote for it, too. Of all the CSU projects on the list, renovation/seismic upgrading of YUH and SPX is at number 21 out of 45 multi-million dollar projects that made the shortlist. Here's why we need your help to get this passed:

- we need additional labs and classrooms to accommodate our higher student numbers. This will be achieved partially by renovation of the old men's locker room. The new locker room will be on the site of the current women's locker room, which will also be renovated, so one side of the towel issue area will be for men and one for women
- the disused old men's pool will be converted in a judo facility, along with additional lecture, lab and office space
- we need additional office space for instructors. A second floor above the main office area will contain these
- it will be wonderful to have a facility that doesn't leak every time it rains and that doesn't blow a fuse whenever a small additional appliance is plugged in! If this passes, construction should be in 2010-2012.

Have a great summer and please vote for the bond measure in November, if it makes it to the ballot!

ment in action, such as the Bodpod, metabolic cart and Cybex machines as well as more traditional-type testing. The program will be broadcast on a Tuesday in July at 7:30 PM.

**Dr. Leamor Kahanov** has accepted a position as Chair of the National Task Force on Medication Handling in Sports Medicine Venues.

**Dr. Susan Wilkinson** continues as Executive Director of the California

Physical Education-Health Project (C PE-HP), a statewide professional development program for physical education and health education teachers



and recently received an additional \$ 534,000 to provide programs for teachers in standards based instruction. This grant brings her funding to over \$3 million.

The Project has just completed its first year working with and supporting the first cadre of its kind in California. Twenty National Board Certification Candidates, those physical educators throughout California who are working on becoming nationally board certified, work on-on-one with currently National Board certified teachers in deepening their content knowledge, assessment strategies, and prepare their professional portfolios for the assessment process. National Board advances the quality of teaching and learning by maintaining high and rigorous standards for what accomplished teachers should know and be able to do and helps teachers become leaders and advocates for education and educational reform. Currently C PE-HP is accepting nominations for the second year of this program. C PE-HP's program has been given national and state attention and recognition. This year C PE-HP will introduce for the first time in the nation, the same subject specific one-on-one support for health education teachers who also desire to become nationally board certified.

One of the two Outstanding Thesis Awards for the entire university went this year goes to a Human Factors Ergonomics/Kinesiology student. Nahida Lebbos' thesis entitled Mouse Device and Method of Support on Muscular Activity examined two mouse types and two methods of hand support. Her work is now entered into the CSU-wide competition. Congratulations to Nahida and to her thesis chair (Dr. Wughalter) and committee members (Dr. Conry and Dr. Kao)—that's fantastic! Nahida was invited to be among the platform party at Commencement.

Congratulations to our two majors of the year, **December Lotz** (Athletic Training) and **Brianna Brown** (Kinesiology). They were honored at the AAHPERD National Convention in Fort Worth, Texas in April.

Thao de Ornelas will be going to the University of the Pacific to earn his Doctorate in Physical Therapy (DPT). He will be starting at the end of August this year and is very excited about this opportunity.

**Bhavesh Mody** is completing his masters degree in our department this semester and will start at Touro College of Osteopathic Medicine in New York in August.

#### **Advocacy Needed**

As you doubtless know, California has a projected budget shortfall. What follows is excerpted from President Don Kassing's April Message to the Campus Community:

"Because of the budget crisis, the CSU has launched a major unified advocacy effort to motivate the legislature and the Governor to support alternative options to maintain the state's investment in the CSU....As part of this effort, each member of our San José State community – whether faculty, staff, students, administrators, or alumni – is being asked to play an active advocacy role in supporting the CSU.

"In January, when Governor Schwarzenegger announced his proposed 2008/09 budget, it did not include funding for the budget plan approved by the California State University Board of Trustees last November. Faced with a growing \$14.5 billion state deficit, the Governor has proposed a \$312.9 million or 10 percent cut in state general fund support for the CSU. In addition, the proposed budget does not include funding to cover the \$73.2 million necessary to avoid a 10 percent student fee increase. Thus, we are facing an alarming \$386.1 million reduction to the CSU budget.

"Although the specific budget impact to San José State will not be known until the May budget revision, a 10 percent reduction in funding would mean up to a \$15.6 million cut to our current budget.....The budget reduction – which comes in addition to funding cuts of \$522 million between 2002 and 2005 – would mean that the CSU would be unable to provide access to 10,000 qualified students....

"The Governor's current budget proposal also would mean more than a \$1 billion loss in economic activity for California. Considered the state's "economic engine," the CSU returns \$4.41 to the California economy for every dollar invested by the state. In addition, the CSU plays a major role in supplying the state's workforce....We must do everything in our power to urge state legislators to restore our budget and protect the state's investment in higher education. I urge each one of you to help us advocate for the California State University by calling or writing your legislators and asking others to do the same. Let's take a stand and support the important educational mission of the California State University system and San José State University."

### **Kinesiology Outstanding Alum of 2008**

Dr. Vic Convertino was named the department's Distinguished Alumnus for 2008. Dr. Convertino is a senior research physiologist for the US Army Institute of Surgical Research at Fort Sam Houston, Texas. Previ-

ous positions included those at Stanford University School of Medicine, the University of Arizona, NASA's Kennedy Space Center, and the U.S. Air Force Research Laboratory. Dr. Convertino's research career includes more than 200 publications in peer-reviewed manuscripts, impacting areas ranging from basic cardiovascular physiology, to applied aspects of exercise science, to aviation and military medicine. Perhaps his most important work is his current research on therapeutic devices to advance the capabilities of combat medics to save the lives of battlefield casualties.

Dr. Convertino was a consultant to the U.S. Department of the Navy Bureau of Medicine and Surgery during Operation Desert Storm, and testified to the Presidential Commission on the Assignment of Women to the Military. He has received numerous recognitions and awards including the U.S. Air Force Scientific Achievement Award, the Research Citation Award from the Society of Critical Care Medicine and was recently inducted into

the U.S. Space Technology Hall of Fame. In addition to his professional contributions, Vic Convertino is dedicated to his family and community. Since 1994, he has coached more than 25 youth teams in soccer, baseball, softball and basketball, has officiated over 1000 soccer, baseball, softball, and basketball games and, in 2006, Dr. Convertino was recognized by the Archdiocese of San Antonio with the CYO Outstanding Adult Leadership Award. Dr. Convertino has a strong connection to the Kinesiology (then Human Performance) Department at San Jose State University. In 1972, he received his

baccalaureate degree from the department and he was also a member of the first SJSU rugby team. From 1981 to 1982, he taught graduate courses in exercise physiology. Congratulations, Vic!



Dr. Dan Landers (BS, '63) was recently inducted into the National Association for Sport and Physical Education (NASPE) Hall of Fame. The citation indicates his "pro-

found impact on the field of sport and exercise physiology." Highlighted were his works in theory-driven research into social facilitation in motor performance, psychophysiology of kinetic energy and on patterns of brain activity during micro- and macro-phases of motor performance. Dan was co-founder and first editor of the Journal of Sport Psychology (now Journal of Sport and Exercise Psychology), has served on the



USOC, as president of the AAPHERD Research Consortium, of the North American Society for the Psychology of Sport and Physical Activity, and the Division of Exercise and Sport Psychology within the American Psychological Association. He is currently Regents' Professor at Arizona State University. Many congratulations, Dan!
