HIGHLIGHTS

“Occupational therapy helps people across the lifespan participate in the things they want and need to do through the therapeutic use of everyday activities (occupations). Common occupational therapy interventions include helping children with disabilities to participate fully in school and social situations, helping people recovering from injury to regain skills, and providing supports for older adults experiencing physical and cognitive changes.”

Occupational therapists ask, “What matters to you?” not, “What’s the matter with you?” (American Occupational Therapy Association)

- ◇ Guidance, suggestions, and support to family members and caregivers

PROGRAMS OFFERED

MS, Occupational Therapy Prerequisites:

- ◇ Baccalaureate degree from an accredited College/University
- ◇ 80 hours volunteer work; 60 hours under direct supervision of an OT/L and 20 hours in a community agency
- ◇ Human Anatomy and Physiology, Neuroanatomy, General Psychology Abnormal Psychology, Social Problems or Cultural Anthropology, Statistics, Skills Course
- ◇ Completion of all prerequisite courses with a grade of B or better prior to entry into the program
- ◇ GPA 3.0 or better in the last 60 semester hours or last 90 quarter units of undergraduate work

OVERVIEW OF THE GRADUATE PROGRAM

The Master of Science in Occupational Therapy program is designed for students who have earned a baccalaureate degree in a discipline other than occupational therapy. It enables the student to obtain the education and degrees necessary to be eligible to practice as an occupational therapist. Once the Master of Science degree in occupational therapy is completed including successful completion of the required 6 months of fieldwork, the student is eligible to sit for the national certification examination. Successful completion of the examination qualifies the candidate to apply for national certification and state licensure.

CURRICULUM

The graduate occupational therapy curriculum can be completed in 2 and ½ years which includes the mandatory 6 months of fieldwork internship.
