Philosophy 70B is a history of Western philosophy course that covers the period from the Renaissance through about 1850. This includes the rise of Renaissance Humanism, the Scientific Revolution, Rationalism and Empiricism as well as the Social and Political philosophies of the French Enlightenment. The course is focused on key theoretical movements of the period including Natural Science, Political Science, Economics, Ethics, as well as developing ideas of race and gender equality and religious toleration.

We'll discuss the origins and effectiveness of the Scientific method, why Capitalism mostly works so far, the origins of racism, where Madison and Hamilton got their ideas for the U.S. Constitution, and why you should be mostly nice to your least favorite neighbor.
